From the Head Master's Desk

Despite their loss to the Aussies in the One Day Series, I was extremely proud of Acting Protea's Captain and DHS Old Boy, Hashim Amla. It is a great honour for him and for the school to have the incumbent Captain a DHS boy, and confirms the proud Cricket tradition that the school has. I was never much of a cricketer myself - the Fiery Fourths was my limit - but I am immensely proud of the Cricket history of this school. We have worked hard to continue this tradition, and I am confident that in our juniors and next year's boys, we have the the potential to continue tradition of excellence that would make Les Theobald smile. I want to congratulate the U16A side in particular. They had a disappointing first term, but been unstoppable have this winning every match. term, Congratulations to the boys and to coach, Marc Adam, who has done a stunning job rebuilding the boys' confidence. It just goes to show what is possible. While we are talking sport, well done to the school on the results against Michaelhouse - all the First Teams won - a fantastic result. Let's hope we can this complete the Treble Saturday against Kearsney!

The Matric examinations are progressing very smoothly and in general the standard of papers has been very good. The first Maths paper was a bit of a stinker, but we are back on track with a better second paper on Monday this week. We have been visited regularly by the monitors, who have been very impressed with the efforts of the school. Thanks to all involved, but particular thanks to Messrs McKenzie and Shore for their organisation.

Last week we hosted four staff Celukuphiwa Combined from School. This is a semi rural school outside Estcourt. It is horrifying to hear just how difficult their conditions are. They have 1500 boys and girls from Grade 0 to Grade 12. They have 15 permanent classrooms, and five prefabs. The smallest classes are in Matric, with 71 learners in one room. Grade 1 has 150 learners in a room. The school has a total of seven pit toilets for 1500 learners and 45 staff. They have virtually no facilities or teaching aids, and some of the learners walk more than 25 kilometres to school. How can learning and teaching place take under these conditions? I doubt that there significant has been any improvement to these learners' lives since the fall of Apartheid. The Government has failed these people miserably, and I suspect there are even worse situations around the country. I have heard from colleagues, for example, that the Eastern Cape is a nightmare.

But while Rome burns, his majesty heads off to Mauritius for a party. It disgusts me the way some of the new elite behave in our society. If we allow this to continue, we are heading for a Banana Republic, like our friends in Zimbobwe and Sobhuzaland. What is it that government does not understand? Corruption is wrong. There are too many people in
